



Devotion Guidelines:

1. Keep it short and interactive
2. Read the Scripture passage together with each person reading a verse
3. Ask questions about each verse
4. Ask each child how they will apply what they have learned from the verses. (Even your young children) You, as a parent, also share what you will apply. Remember that Bible study is for application and transformation not just for information.)
5. Pray together as a family (You and your children can take turns praying)
 - For each other's requests
 - To ask for God's help to apply what you have learned

Read Together:

Matthew 6:5-15 ⁵“When you pray, you are not to be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and on the street corners so that they may be seen by men. Truly I say to you, they have their reward in full. ⁶But you, when you pray, go into your inner room, close your door and pray to your Father who is in secret, and your Father who sees what is done in secret will reward you. ⁷“And when you are praying, do not use meaningless repetition as the Gentiles do, for they suppose that they will be heard for their many words. ⁸So do not be like them; for your Father knows what you need before you ask Him. ⁹“Pray, then, in this way: ‘Our Father who is in heaven, Hallowed be Your name. ¹⁰‘Your kingdom come. Your will be done, On earth as it is in heaven. ¹¹‘Give us this day our daily bread. ¹²‘And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. ¹³‘And do not lead us into temptation, but deliver us from evil. [For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.]’ ¹⁴For if you forgive others for their transgressions, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. ¹⁵But if you do not forgive others, then your Father will not forgive your transgressions.



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Talk Together:

1. In verses 5-6, what do you think God is most concerned with – our physical posture in praying or our heart's posture? What should our attitude be?
2. In verses 7-8, do you think God is concerned with the length of our prayers?
3. Verse 9 – 13 offers a pattern on how we should pray. What does verse 9 tell us about how we relate to God? In verse 10, how does this affect our personal perspective?
4. In verses 11- 13, what are the other requests that we should pray for? In verse 11, why do you think Jesus asked us to pray for our daily bread? What is he teaching us?

Conviction:

Prayer is blessing. I will devote more time in intentional prayer.

Application:

Do you pray only when you are in need? How can your prayer life improve?

Pray Together:

Heavenly Father, thank You for the privilege of letting us come freely to You in prayer. Help us to develop an attitude that seeks You first in everything that we do through prayer. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

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
